

PHAB accreditation application filed

I am pleased to tell you that March 31, 2017, IDPH submitted our application to the <u>Public Health Accreditation Board</u> (PHAB) for national accreditation. We have been working strategically towards this goal for the last year and a half and teams are already collecting the documentation we will submit. Through the process, we've found some things we are doing very well, some things we need to document more clearly, and other things we need to start doing. This work is part of a journey towards a culture of quality and we consider accreditation a demonstration of our ability to meet best practices. The department plans to submit all documentation to PHAB in December 2017.

West Union on the move

Gundersen Palmer Community Health is a nonprofit hospital-based public health department serving the residents of Fayette County. With a 40 percent adult obesity rate, the county's 2015 CHNA-HIP survey showed the number one concern among adult residents was obesity. To address this issue, the county collaborated with local city government, regional stakeholders, and schools to launch the West Union Walkability Initiative this month. The partnership includes daily Walking School Buses, Whistle Walks, five new Little Libraries, and a community Walking Map.

Opioid workshop for community health workers

County-level Rates of Senior Food Insecurity*

Food insecurity (as represented in the USDA Food Security Report) is the household-level economic and social condition of limited or uncertain access to adequate food. The percent represented in each county is the county-level rate of food insecurity (Map the Meal Gap, 2016). That percent was then applied to the number of seniors in each county to obtain the percent of food insecure seniors in each county.

To obtain the food insecurity estimates the following variables were used: unemployment rate, poverty rate, home ownership rate, and other demographic variables that are publicly available at both the county and state level. County-level estimates were derived from the state-level relationships that exist between these variables and food insecurity. Food-insecurity estimates at the county level may be less stable from year to year than those at the state or national level due to smaller geographies, particularly in counties with very small populations.
