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## Iowa leads in children's health care

According to [WalletHub](#), Iowa ranks first in the nation in children's oral health care, fifth in the nation for kids' access to health care and fourth overall nationally for children's health care.

## IDPH conducts sexual violence survey

The [survey](#) is to gather Iowans' knowledge of, and opinions about, sexual violence in their communities. It's voluntary and anonymous, and is expected to take approximately 15 minutes to complete. The information collected can help to inform efforts to support survivors and prevent future violence.

## Local public health success story

Marshall County Public Health was called into action when a person in the community was diagnosed with tuberculosis (TB) disease. The investigation found 12 individuals, including two babies, had been exposed to TB. All were monitored and/or treated for latent TB, which can progress in young children very rapidly once infected.

provider's office to assure adherence to the protocol was understood and completed. Public health went into each child's home twice a week to give the medicine and treatment continued until the babies were 6 months old. At that time, the babies were again examined, TB skin tests were given and chest x-rays were taken. All tests were negative.

The intervention prevented two babies from developing tuberculosis disease through the partnership of the health care provider, public health and the parents who cooperated and assisted with the treatment regimen.

In her spare time, Cheryl loves to garden, but has surrendered most of her gardening to the wildlife, which treats her garden as its private buffet line!

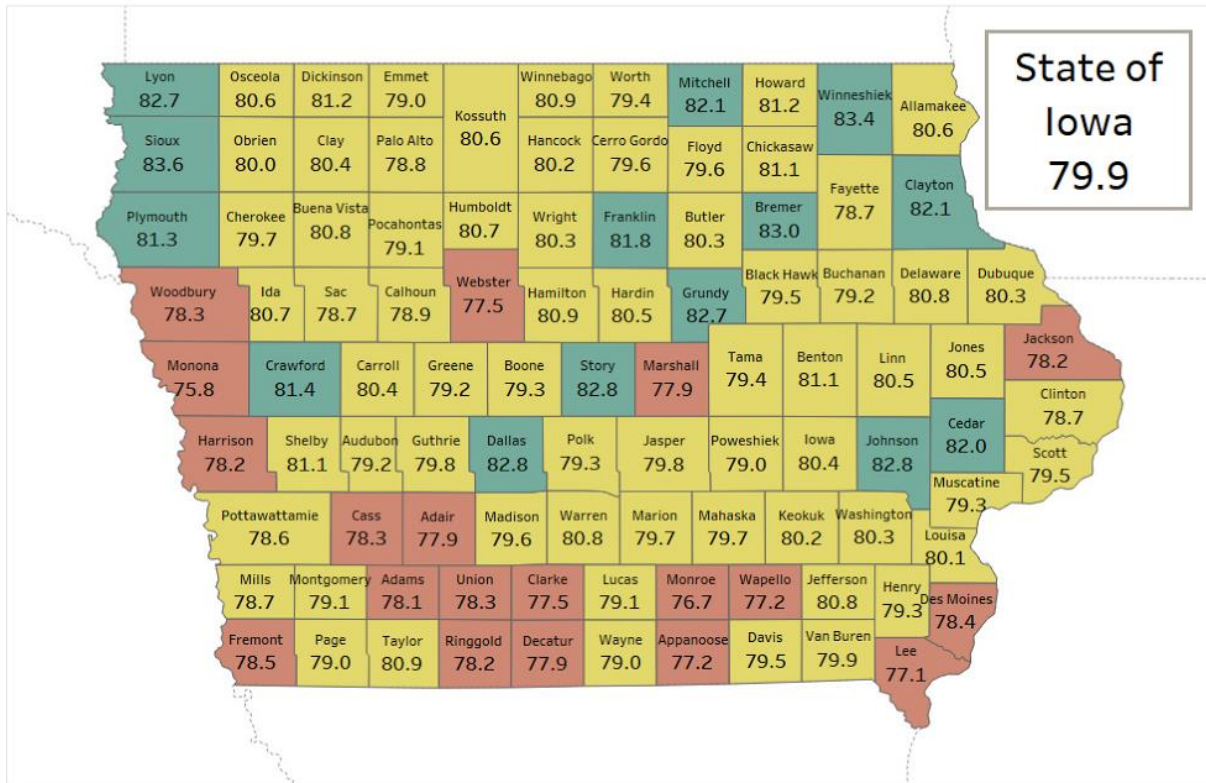
