IPHT updates

The <u>Iowa Public Health Tracking</u> (IPHT) portal has launched several data updates, including childhood lead (includes annual 3 year old and 6 year old cohort data); reproductive outcomes (includes infant mortality, preterm and low birth weights data); demographics (includes race, ethnicity, age and gender data); county health snapshots (includes 84 measures of health by topic area); and more.

IPHT is a state of the art environmental and public health tracking program, and part of a <u>national initiative</u> led by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to close the gap in what is known about the impact of environmental hazards on health. The data can improve the understanding of hazards and lead to actions that may prevent chronic illnesses.

Campus sexual violence prevention

lowa was one of 15 states chosen by the CDC's Injury Prevention and Control program to participate in a planning meeting for Campus Sexual Violence Prevention last month in Atlanta. Members of the Iowa team include Binnie LeHew of the IDPH Office of Disability, Injury and Violence Prevention and four representatives from Drake University, the University of Northern Iowa, and the Iowa Coalition Against Sexual Assault. The team will promote prevention strategies to prevent sexual violence on Iowa's college campuses.

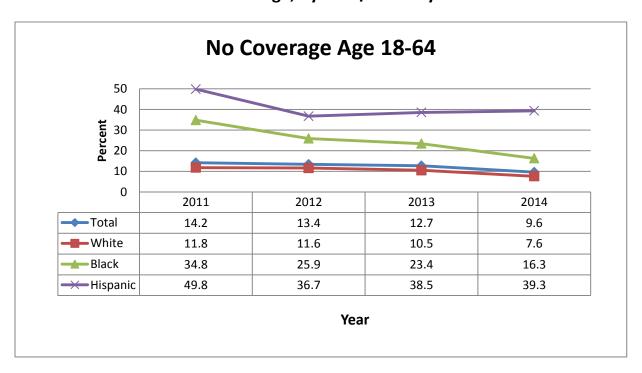
Healthy Iowans

Initial planning is underway for the development of the <u>Healthy Iowans</u>: Iowa's Health Improvement Plan 2017-2021. Thirty-nine ad hoc and legislatively-mandated advisory committees will play a key role in creating this roadmap for the health of Iowans. Orientation for lead staff is planned this fall.

Percent of Non-elderly Adults Reporting Currently Not Having Health Insurance Coverage, By Race/Ethnicity



This figure presents the percentage of non-elderly adults (age 18-64) by race/ethnicity who reported currently not having health insurance coverage. Lack of health insurance showed a marked decline, especially in the latest year, for all racial/ethnic groups except Hispanics who had the highest level throughout the period and only showed a decline from the first year. The 2011-2014 BRFSS data show a 4.6 percentage point decrease in lack of coverage among all non-elderly adults.
