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

Emmet: 21% (14.1% - 30.2%)

Palo Alto: 22.0% (6.7% - 37.4%) (2011-14 average)

### Youth any tobacco use prevalence

Iowa Youth Survey, 2014

Buena Vista: 19.1%

Clay: 22.9%

Dickinson: 15.5%

Emmet: 18.6%

Palo Alto: 11.2%

Population counts are based on 2014 estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau. Adult prevalence estimates are self-reported rates and confidence intervals of rates of cigarette smoking in Iowans 18 and older, average annual rate. Youth rates are self-reported tobacco use rates in 11th grade students. Less than half of 11th grade students in these counties participated in the survey: Boone, Butler, Clarke, Dallas, Des Moines, Fremont, Keokuk, Jasper, Lee, Mahaska, Polk, Poweshiek, Washington and Wayne. In many cases, the percentages shown here for counties with low participation rates will reflect closely their actual rates. Any youth tobacco use includes e-cigarette use. \*At least 5% of all county inpatient records are missing. Deaths are from 2010-14 for COPD and stroke and 2012-14 for heart disease and cancer. Hospitalizations are from 2009-11.
