Progress notes: Expanding from the previous progress report, West Union was chosen by IDPH as a pilot community to implement 5-2-1-0 Healthy Choices count messaging. Our STEPS stakeholders worked together to implement messaging across multiple sectors such as healthcare, childcare, preschools, school, businesses and community. Presented at the Iowa Hospital Association Conference with our hospital CEO on Social Determinants on the topic of community health programs addressing social determinants such as walking school bus and STEPS stakeholders group. In addition, the stakeholders in the communities of West Union and Oelwein in Fayette County are working with Healthy Hometown Powered by Wellmark to create, implement and measure community action plans and Healthy Hometown designation. The Community Health Coordinator was asked to present West Union's case study to the state-level stakeholders of Iowa Healthiest State Initiative, 5-2-1-0 and Healthy Hometown on June 12th.

Progress notes: Building community and county collaboration in Fayette County is continuing to gain momentum and making impacts on our obesity rate by addressing accessible food and the build environment. The community West Union was chosen again in year two of the 5-2-1-0 campaign. Year two goals for West Union include:

- Creating an outdoor hospital lobby space for patients, visitors and staff at Gundersen Palmer Lutheran Hospital and Clinics which unveiled in May of 2019
- Setting-up an open meal site for youth in West Union to ensure all children are receiving nutritious meals when school is not in session and ensure no child goes hungry. This initiative, TigerHawk Meals is to launch June 10th, 2019 and brought together the following sectors of a community: NFV School District, North Fayette Valley Community Coalition, North Fayette Valley Ministers, local churches, Helping Services for Youth and Families, TigerHawk Connections Learning Center (before/after school & summer camp), Northeast Iowa Food Bank, and tribe of community volunteers. This summer meal site will feed approximately 75 kids a day, five days a week, June 10th – August 23rd, 2019 for a total of 4125 meals.
- Create a new West Union Elementary playground to be a safe and accessible outdoor space for children of all abilities; to improve design to maximize space for outdoor play; and to provide natural elements to encourage free play for creativity and social interaction. The local North Fayette Elementary PTO has taken this project and ran with it. Developing a playground committee and already raised \$25,000 of the \$150,000 needed for this project since January 2019.
- Continue to spread the 5-2-1-0 message within the West Union community through programming, events, activities, presentations, meetings, marketing items and other opportunities

In addition, Gundersen Palmer Community Health, the city of West Union and other community leaders have worked closely with Healthy HometownSM Powered by Wellmark to develop a vision of health and well-being as well as a master plan for the community of West Union. This plan includes the tactics, or areas of focus, of Eat Well, Move More and Feel Better. The West Union Elementary received a 5-2-1-0 grant and funded dice activity boxes in every classroom for teachers to use with their current curriculum and brain breaks. The TigerHawk Connection Learning Center Summer Camp program and Kaleidoscope Kids a child care center in West Union, are implementing a new curriculum summer of 2019 with University of Iowa called Healthy LifeStars.
